President's Column

As we begin 2006, I would like to reflect back over the highlights of 2005, our 25th Anniversary year:

12 February—the formal construction (22 miles of new trail in Phase II) of the BMT was concluded.

30 April—at the Southeastern Foot Trails Conference in South Carolina, the BMTA was presented the 2004 American Hiking Society's Trail Achievement Award for our perseverance in getting the trail route's final approval.

14-15 May—Dick Evans led a team of BMTA volunteers in putting route markers on trail junction signs along the BMT route in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

4 June—NATIONAL TRAIL DAY—at the dedication of the Unicoi Turnpike Trail (a spur trail off the BMT at Unicoi Gap near Coker Creek, Tennessee) the BMTA was presented a Certificate of Appreciation from the USDA Forest Service for our part in restoring a portion of the Unicoi Turnpike for hiking.

25 June—Founder's Day Hike—Tony Oldfield led 30 hikers who spent the day hiking and sharing history and special stories about the inception, and beginning phase of constructing the BMT.

16 July—Grand Opening and Dedication Ceremony—well over 100 folks were on hand to witness Construction Director Ken Jones and founding member George Owen lop the vine to officially open the BMT. After some inaugural hikes, we concluded the day with a delicious chili supper at Rattler Ford campground.

15 October—the 25th Anniversary dinner/annual meeting in Blue Ridge, Georgia. This event featured a look back at our history, as well as a look forward to the great opportunities in store for the organization.

6 December—the BMTA was presented with a second Certificate of Appreciation from the USDA Forest Service for our participation in the volunteer program in the Ocoee/Hiwassee Ranger District of the Cherokee National Forest.

I think you will agree with me that this has been a great year for the BMTA. I deeply appreciate all who have helped with, and supported the above events. We have come a long way from 1980, and have a proud history.

News from the Ocoee River Gorge by Steve Cartwright

On **30 November**, I had the pleasure to participate in the dedication on new trail (part of the Tanasi trail system) linking the BMT with the Ocoee Whitewater Center (OWC). The

Rhododendron Trail begins just before you cross the bridge over the Ocoee River, at the power substation, and follows the river coming out at the picnic area just below the OWC. It is a very easy, gentle walk (handicap accessible), with a beautiful section of board walk that juts out over the river where you can pause and observe rafters and kayakers floating by. The trail eliminates the previous road walk between the guard rails on US 64. So, for those thru-hiking the trail, it serves as a more scenic route to get to the OWC which can serve as an information point and possible shuttle venue to the Copper Basin area. I was asked, and agreed, to give a brief talk on the importance of the trail to the BMT and the hiking community in general. Among those present for the dedication were: Hoyt Firestone, Polk County Mayor, Tom Speaks, CNF Forest Supervisor, and US Representative Zach Wamp (R), who procured funding for the trail...on 6 December the BMTA was presented with a Certificate of Appreciation from the USDA Forest Service for our participation in the "Volunteer Program" coordinated by Trails Technician, Steve Biatowas for the Ocoee/Hiwassee Ranger District in the Cherokee National Forest. Ocoee/Hiwassee RD "Volunteer Program" was recognized by the Regional Forester as an exemplary program in Region 8 (all National Forests in the southern states, including Puerto Rico). The certificate was awarded at a reception held at the OWC. President Steve Cartwright was on hand to accept the award from Forest Supervisor, Tom Speaks, along with the following members: Ken Jones, Robert Ownbey (who was also recognized individually), Betty Petty, Clayton Pannell, Bill and Diana Ristom. Many thanks to all who have worked on the trail in the Ocoee/Hiwassee Ranger District-your work has not gone unnoticed!

DECEMBER WORK TRIP IN GEORGIA

They are the newly assigned maintainers on this long section, stretching 4.2 miles from Big Stamp Gap to Three Forks. As we entered the AT parking area on FS 42, we were treated to a spectacular nature show, with the morning sun shining brightly on the ice-encrusted tree crowns. Fortunately for us, most of the ice had fallen in the area we worked.

A footnote to this report -- As we were digging drainage dips, someone remarked about how nice it was to have sharp tools with which to work. We applaud the work of Tom (T.O.) Mitchell, our excellent and dedicated tool maintainer. It is easier to maintain a trail when we have maintained tools. Thanks, T.O., for a great job.

On a clear frosty morning, ten workers showed up to do some serious reconstruction on the lower John Muir Trail. After a safety meeting in the parking lot at Big Bend, we hiked down the JMT about 0.8 mi toward Childers Creek to reach the work area near the rock step/overlook. The work consisted of filling two places that the river was washing out under the trail, and reconstruction of about 400 ft of badly eroded trail. At the end of the day, we had repaired most of the trail in the area of the rock steps but did no work on the steps themselves. After hiking back to the Big Bend picnic area, we installed the sign identifying the Cherokee Hiking Club as maintainers of this section of trail, then drove around to Childers Creek and installed the other sign there. Thanks to all who came out to work on the trail and a special thanks to Steve Biatowas and the Forest Service for the signs. A special thanks also to Kent and Pam Mathews who came all the way from Powell, TN (north of Knoxville) for their first work trip.

Workers were Ken Jones, Robert Owenby, Stephen Cartwright, Al Rymer, Bill Ristom, Linda Davis, Kent Mathews, Pam Mathews, Steve Biatowas, and Clayton Pannell; who together accumulated 58.5 work hours and 18.5 travel hours for a total of 77.0 hours, all reported to the Ocoee/Hiwassee District of the Cherokee National Forest.
