There are a few of us who can't carry a bagpack not to mention a chain saw, but we are lucky that the BMTA has lots of needs. Not all of these can be done from an armchair but they don't require a lot of physical effort. Here are some ways you can help "while slowing down".

- 1. "Man" (or "woman") a BMTA exhibit at a festival, fair, or community event. You can take your armchair with you and sit and visit with folks all day. Contact Ralph or Marge Heller for details.

## SAVE THE DATE - JULY 30TH, 2011!!!! by Dick Evans

Most of us remember memorizing the poem, "Trees", by Joyce Kilmer in school, if we can remember that long ago, and some of us know that the poet was male, despite the first name. Others know that the Benton MacKaye Trail goes thru the "Joyce Kilmer – Slickrock Wilderness" on the Tennessee / North Carolina border, but now, as a famous radio pundit put it, here is the "rest of the story".


Joyce Kilmer wrote many other poems, although his etherial "Trees" struck a nerve in the United States and indeed around the world. It was (and is) a poignant essay, especially for one so young. Kilmer was killed near the end of World War I while on a scouting mission in France. In the early 1930's, what was then the Bozeman Bulgar Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars started a campaign to have a forest area designated in memorial to this patriot. Congressional action followed, and the Chief of the US Forest Service, after extensive review of suggested areas, chose an area of virgin timber in a little-known county of Graham, in western North Carolina, to be dedicated to Kilmer and his poem, "...until time shall be no more." The dedication was held on July 30<sup>th</sup>, 1936.

Thanks to the mathematical abilities of Deputy District Ranger Lauren Stull of the Tusquittee/Cheoah Ranger District of the US Forest Service, there will be a rededication ceremony on the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of that event this coming July 30<sup>th</sup>. Various activites are planned for the Rattler Ford area of the Joyce Kilmer – Slickrock Wilderness for that entire day,including road races, exhibitions of traditional forestry methods, stewardship instruction and a formal rededication by a joint VFW/American Legion Team of veterans. This promises to be a memorable event, and everyone is invited. Put it on your calendar now! The web site, <a href="https://www.joycekilmerslickrock.org">www.joycekilmerslickrock.org</a> will have details as the date nears. In the interest of full disclosure, I am on the planning committee for the event, as well as being a Director of the Partners of the Joyce Kilmer – Slickrock Wilderness, Inc., sponsoring the event.

In addition to the award received by Ken Jones as the Tennessee Trail Worker Award, Tennessee was well represented among other awards, including the following:

Phil Bredesen, Governor of Tennessee, received the very presitgious "Outstanding Service Award". During his eight years of office, he tirelessly supported the state park system and was instrumental in protecting over 650,000 acres of Tennessee land from development by purchase or lease by the state. The state parks system earned the distinction of becoming the best park system in the USA and the TDEC magazine *The Tennessee Conservationist* was recognized as the best such publication in the country. Under his guidance, the TN Greenways & Trails Commission was recognized as the best such program in the country. He also is actively working to protect the Cumberland Plateau from any further mountain top removal.

Bob Richards, as the TN Greenways & Trails Commission Coordinator, won the "State Trail Advocacy Award". SORBA (Southern Off-Road Bicycle Assn) and the TVA received the "Partnership Award" for the joint development of the Raccoon Mountain Bicycle Trails near Chattanooga.

Bob Fulcher, Park Director of the Cumberland Trail State Park, won the "Outstanding Media Award" for the weekly radio show he does on a radio station in Knoxville where he spotlights musicians and unique people of the Cumberland Plateau.

The City of Chattanooga won the "Planning/Design Award" for the development of the Tennessee Riverpark. The Lyndhurst Foundation of Chattanooga won the "Corporate Award" for their continuous and generous support of the trail system in Chattanooga.

#### Devoted BMT Maintainer Bill Shubert Dies By George Owen

Soft-spoken, humorous Bill Shubert died November 26 at age 82 in Hartwell, Georgia after several years of illness. He and his wife Mary Jon were outstanding maintainers of two Georgia Benton MacKaye Trail sections, 05b – Ledford Gap to Brawley Mountain, and then subsequently 05d – Dial Road to Shallowford Bridge.

Tom Keene noted that when he was GA trail supervisor that in just the first half of 2005 Bill and Mary Jon recorded over a quarter of all hours worked on the BMT in the Peach State. Tom further reported that for three years Bill Shubert had the largest number of of reported work/travel hours in the BMTA. He also received the "Golden Pulaski" as the "Maintainer of the Year" in 2003. In addition, one of the Shubert children, Rhonda, along with her husband Terry, maintained section 08e, Fowler Mountain to Halloway Gap.

David Blount had another memory of him, how Bill "helped me maintain the top of my old section on the west side of

Brawley...I don't think I ever heard an unkind word out of Bill." Bill and Mary Jon loved the fellowship of the club, such as our annual meeting events.

Born in Pratt, Alabama, he served in the Korean War as a Marine and retired subsequently from the Air Force. He entered public education in Georgia after his military career, and was eventually Director of Special Education in Gwinnett County.

He also loved to hike, having trekked the length of the Bartram Trail and the Georgia section of both the Benton MacKaye and Appalachian trails. He was part of the Highpointers Club, and bagged many high points. He so enjoyed hiking that his trail name was "Walking Willie."

Bill's memorial service was held December 1 at Hartwell First United Methodist Church. He is survived by four children, three sons and daughter Rhonda. Donations in his memory may be made to the BMTA or to Hart County Habitat for Humanity.

The many of us who knew Bill will certainly miss him. More than one person commented on his "gentle humor." The BMTA has certain lost one of its best maintainers and most faithful members!

We found tracks of a small animal, probably a mouse or vole, going halfway across the driveway, then stopping in a bunch of disturbed snow, probably as an owl or hawk found a meal. Those types of things are part of our (and their) daily life, but winter gives us a chance to observe it. As MacKaye said, part of the reason for hiking is "...to see, and to see what you have seen." Winter gives us that opportunity.
