

Georgia's Cool May Work Trip Has Instruction and Construction

It looked all day as though our BMTA May 12 new trail construction trip out of No-Name Gap would get rain – and some was predicted – but nary a drop fell on our work crew at all. Instead, it was cool and breezy, flying insects stayed away, and it was a great work trip for the eleven who turned out and worked. (Two more showed up at the Three Forks meeting place over a half-hour late, but never found the work site.)

Our trip was highlighted by two guests I had invited to join us. Early on I had asked recently retired Forest Service employee/ trails technician **David Kuykendall** to come out and give us some on-the-ground training in "dips and knicks" – the modern way to build and drain trails: rolling grade dips, grade reversals, and knicks; these are techniques to improve trails and move beyond the more temporary and less satisfactory overall solution of waterbars. David took time with all then in small groups to give specific practice in creating these.

Our other guest was Kuykendall's replacement on the Blue Ridge Ranger District (Blairsville), **Taylor Hamilton**, who arrived just over a month ago here from the Talladega National Forest at the district office in Heflin, AL. She joined with David in giving us on-location instruction in the newer techniques of trail water drainage mentioned above.

David was also glad to see and note that we already had some rolling grade dips and grade reversals in the portions of this relocation previously constructed. Taylor and David did the instruction in the morning and then joined us in the afternoon for some hardy trail digging.

Despite some time out for instructions mentioned above, most of our day (several hours) were devoted by each of us to digging the new trail route with Pulaskis, fire rakes, McLeods, and hoes. The section had been cleared of brush and prepped for this work Satur-

day by yours truly a few days earlier, so construction moved right along.

We are now somewhere between two-thirds and three-fourths the way toward having this No-Name Gap northward relocation finished. **The Georgia work trip on June 9 is scheduled to return here**.

The work of all of you is especially appreciated this month in moving this project closer to completion. Thank you, and a very special big thanks also to Taylor Hamilton and David Kuykendall for joining us and contributing to our trail knowledge, expertise, and efforts.

Fearless Foursome Prep Trail Route for June Construction

Four of us BMTAers visited the site of the BMT reroute Friday, May 18, at No-Name Gap 2.6 miles north of Three Forks to prepare the last twenty-plus percent of the proposed route for final completion hopefully on the June 9 Georgia maintenance trip.

Darcy Douglas, Michael O'Brien, George Owen, and Mark Yost each worked for five hours in moderate temperature with a nice breeze to clear and break up the soil on the upper part of the trail sidehill. After lunch Darcy dropped back to No-Name Gap to begin blaze painting and officially opening the previously completed lower trail switchbacks for public use. The other three of us continued clearing and breaking soil for the June workers to within twenty feet of the reroute completion on the ridge. We each put in five hours of work apiece and arrived back at our vehicles in the hilltop meadow just as rain sprinkles began for what was later to become a downpour.

We are happy to report that the soil in this upper area beyond where we left off in the official May work trip is fairly rich loam that is much easier to loosen and work with less rock and roots. It should result in our June construction moving at an easier and better pace than last trip.

So to all your BMTAers of every ability and stripe: Come on our **June 9 work trip** for what we hope will be the final No-Name Gap work trip and the final blaze painting and official opening of the trail. **Meet at 8:00 a.m. for breakfast at the Blue Ridge Village Restaurant or at 9:20 at Three Forks**.

Terry's first BMTA work trip was sometime back in mid 90's. He and his son Sean were introduced to the Benton MacKaye trail by Terry's wife's cousin,




Tom Wright. They were captivated by the trail and the association fellowship and participated in several work trips every year back then until Sean started college and Terry started traveling out of town weekly for work.
