Hike and Help the Hemlocks ...

On Sept 28, Public Lands Day, the BMTA sponsored a hike in the Cooper Creek Scenic Area as part of the Hike and Help the Hemlocks cooperative event with Donna Shearer and Save Georgia's Hemlocks. The hike was a little over 3 miles in length. The route covered part of the Yellow Mountain Trail, Cooper Creek Connector Trail and part of the Mill Shoals Trail, to make an easy loop. For most folks on this



trip, the Cooper Creek Scenic area was a new trail experience. This route took the hikers through sections containing some large old-growth trees. Along the way, numerous hemlock trees severely infected by the Hemlock Woolly Adelgid insects were pointed out. The problem to the hemlocks was explained and measures to save the trees were described. Twenty hikers participated.




After the hike, almost everyone met up with the Save Georgia's Hemlocks group of 56 folks at Sea Creek Falls. These volunteers had been treating approximately 360 trees in the Mulky and Clements Branch hemlock conservation areas. During lunch time at the falls, everyone was treated to information on Save Georgia's Hemlocks and efforts in different areas to treat the hemlocks by Donna Shearer and Dave Teffeteller. Short talks were given by organizations participating in this event. These included the Benton MacKaye Trail Association (Ralph

Heller), the Mountain Stewards(Don Wells), Georgia Tech Trail Blazers(Patrick Shower) and Go Outdoors USA. Jim Wentworth representing the USFS Blue Ridge District also spoke.
